2020 NRHA FUTURITY CHAMPION TO WIN A QUARTER MILLION

The National Reining Horse Association (NRHA) made the landmark announcement today that the 2020 NRHA Futurity champion will receive a quarter of a million dollars! The news came during the association's Annual General Meeting and was accompanied by the additional announcement that the NRHA Non Pro Futurity Champion will receive \$60,000, and added money for the Adequan® North American Affiliate Championship (NAAC) will be doubled.

The stunning hat-trick announcement came after a special task force formed and met during the Annual NRHA Winter Meeting in Denton, Texas, to discuss a pathway to increasing the payout at the NRHA Futurity, beginning with the 2020 event. Chaired by NRHA Vice President Rick Clark, the task force was created to answer a challenge that he, along with NRHA Past President Frank Costantini and former NRHA Board Member Doug Carpenter, had given

the board to begin to grow the NRHA Futurity winners' rewards.

Serving on the task force along with Clark are John Tague, Mike Hancock, Mark Blake, Ginger Schmersal, Rosanne Sternberg, and Shane Brown.

The NRHA Futurity has seen many significant milestones in its storied past. This included the move to a guaranteed \$100,000 prize for the Open Futurity Winner in 1983 and the creation of the nomination program, which now helps fund all levels of the event. Since then, the first-place check for the Level 4 Open Champion had increased to \$150,000.

The named increases are, according to the task force, based on independent funds raised from individuals interested in boosting the industry and shining a brighter light

on the NRHA Futurity. Those funds came from five-year support commitments from Tim Anderson and Kim Niven, John and Nancy Tague, Rick Clark, Bob Santagata, Craig and Ginger Schmersal, Mark Blake, Joao Marcos, and Mike Hancock, and are, in the words of NRHA President Mike Hancock, a starting place in the goal of establishing the NRHA Futurity and Adequan® NAAC as one of the most prestigious events in the horse world. It has certainly done that, boosting the NRHA Futurity winner's payment to exceed those of all other futurities in the Western performance horse industry.

"This was spontaneous combustion in the best way," said NRHA Commissioner Gary Carpenter. "It came together because the right people were in the right place at the right

time. So many factors around the world influenced this development. We all recognize that the horses bred for the NRHA Futurity will become the horses of the future for all levels of competition. The increased purse in both the Futurity and the Adequan® NAAC illustrates our commitment to these horses and the people who breed, own, train, and ride them."

Hancock agrees about the positive ripple effect of this evolution of the sport.

"This year's quarter of a million is just the first step..."

"This year's quarter of a million is just the first step," Hancock said. "This committee foresees additional support opportunities becoming available for this endeavor in the future. We don't know where it is going to end yet, but we are excited for the future."

The top fifteen riders on the NRCHA's Open Eligibility list for 2020 are invited to enter. The eligibility is based on the rider, not the horse, so riders can choose any Bridle horse. If an invited rider cannot participate for any reason, the next rider on NRCHA's list will be invited to participate and so on. Dave Hammond of Skyline Silversmiths and Vaquero Trophy & Tack said, "It is a real honor to be the official buckle

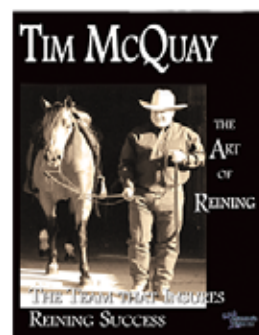
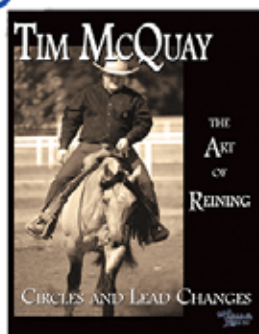
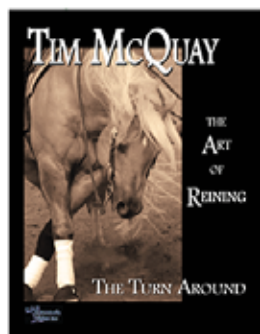

US EQUESTRIAN OUTLINES KEY AREAS OF SUCCESS, NEW GOALS AT 2020 ANNUAL MEETING

President Murray Kessler and senior staff report on membership growth, program successes, and new member benefits.

At US Equestrian's 2020 Annual Meeting in West Palm Beach, Fla., federation President Murray Kessler unveiled statistics that show how a vibrant US Equestrian that is growing membership, boosting sponsorships, and building for the future with new initiatives and operational efficiencies. Themed "Focus on the Future," the 2020 meeting emphasized how the strategic plan Kessler launched in 2017 is paying off—and set US Equestrian up for a brighter future to achieve both sporting and business goals.

Video from the 2020 Annual Meeting—including General Session presentations by US Equestrian President Kessler, Chief Executive Officer Bill Moroney, and senior staff, as well as interactive panel discussions—are available on demand on USEF Network. Tune in at usef.org/network/coverage/2020annualmeeting. The videos also include coverage from the Pegasus Awards dinner and Horse of the Year Gala.

"We started with a stagnant membership," Kessler reminded attendees at the Jan. 9 General Session. "It was a slightly declining membership of 80,000 that was stuck there for more than a decade, and we were being criticized.

It was viewed that USEF was just a place to get a license to be able to compete and served no other purpose and had no other benefits. It was a pretty tough place to be.

“We took on the role saying we were going to change all of that, and we put forth the vision to bring the joy of horse sports to as many people as possible.”



Kessler praised US Equestrian’s “disciplined approach” to achieving a virtuous circle: improve core processes and capabilities in order to ensure fairness, safety, and enjoyment for members; provide a sufficient pathway for members to win at the highest level and inspire the next generation; then spread the word through marketing, which serves to grow membership, fans, sponsorship, and support. The results so far are impressive, as Kessler and US Equestrian’s senior staff, led by Chief Executive

Officer Bill Moroney, pointed out in their General Session presentations:

- Membership has skyrocketed since 2016. US Equestrian membership currently exceeds 187,000 total members and 100,000 fan members. More than 45,387 new members joined the organization just this year, with an increased number of former members renewing their membership at some level.

- Members are competing, many for the first time. In 2019 alone, 81,000 horses competed in more than 2,300 events nationwide, while 14,062 members competed for the first time, showing a significant increase in competition attendance and increased opportunities for members to compete.

- Members are engaging with good content. US Eques-

trian’s Learning Center is home to over 80 educational videos, which have been viewed by 32,000 unique members and amassed an impressive 320,000 views across US Equestrian’s social media platforms. Currently, US Equestrian’s social media platforms have over 800,000 followers, generated 20 million video views, and 170 million impressions on the 5,000 posts curated in 2019.

- USEF Network has become a valuable asset for both engaging current members and drawing in new ones, with more than 1.3 million total plays this year on streams and content showcasing the diversity and scope of equestrian sport, including reining at the 2019 Intercollegiate Horse Show Association National Championship.

- Fan memberships have brought short- and long-term value, adding revenue and access to new members with diverse equestrian interests. Fan membership also is rebuilding connections: 14,847 current fan members are former competing members.

- New office will achieve savings. US Equestrian’s new headquarters at the Kentucky Horse Park will save more than \$200,000 annually and has provided a collaborative, functional workspace for staff to better serve member needs.

- Outsourced drug testing creates efficiencies as equine welfare remains paramount. This year, US Equestrian outsourced drug testing to the University of Kentucky lab, overseen by Dr. Scott Stanley. Along with the change in laboratory and testing site, US Equestrian also added medroxyprogesterone (MPA) and cannabidiol (CBD) to the list of banned substances in an effort to protect horse welfare.

Safe Sport: More Clarity, Targeted Resources

The past year did not come without challenges and value-driven decisions, including the reaffirmed commitment to Safe Sport and the implementation of the federally mandated Minor Athlete Abuse

Prevention (MAAP) policies. As a of the meeting, 61,534 active members over the age of 18 are SafeSport trained and

US Equestrian received a SafeSport audit score of 100% in review of its compliance with its policies and procedures.

In an effort to bring more clarity to Safe Sport compliance, US Equestrian has unveiled improved Safe Sport navigation and web pages redesigned for each Safe Sport target audience: trainer, rider, parents, affiliates, licensed

officials, and competition organizers. Each page leads with educational videos, need-to-know information, and easy-to-navigate icons. The new website content and a targeted

social media campaign also will address common Safe Sport misconceptions, and US Equestrian also plans town hall meetings to address member questions.

New Member Benefits and Renewing Affiliates

The General Session also revealed valuable new benefits for US Equestrian members, most notably including health and liability insurance for paid fan and competing members, as well as group discounted medical plans for businesses with two or more employees, including sole proprietors, small businesses, and corporations. This follows the introduction of a free mental health aid for members, which launched in 2019. The insurance program for members will continue to grow in 2020 and offer flexibility and additional

coverage needs for all paying members.

On the affiliate membership side, affiliate relationships have continued to grow, and positive conversations are ongoing to find ways to create two-way value for US Equestrian and its affiliate members. Fifteen of 19 affiliates currently have membership agreements in place, while 2019 marked an end of affiliate partnerships with the American Driving Society and the American Endurance Ride Conference.

Building for the Future and Winning to Inspire

When U.S. athletes succeed in elite international competition, they also inspire future generations at every level of equestrian sport. That strengthens programs that are committed to developing equestrian talent. In 2019, youth teams excelled, sweeping numerous competitions and medaling in top international competitions. Investing in that young talent strengthens the future of U.S. equestrian sport and its programs as we look toward events that will serve as performance indicators in the next decade, including the 2028 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

You can have success but you might only have success in a small, narrow realm,” Moroney said. “To be truly successful as a sport, it takes coming together and working together to find the commonalities that are going to bring our sport to a new level to create more awareness to make it more popular to bring more people to us.”

In the near term, sponsor relationships and revenue will be a key indicator of success this year. These partnerships bring value to US Equestrian members, and they provide important support for team performance and enhance programs that benefit athletes and competitors. US Equestrian also will work more closely in partnership with the USET Foundation to grow support through education and promotion.

US Equestrian CEO Moroney closed out the session by noting that US Equestrian plans to host a “future of sport” assembly in the spring of 2020 and aims to address a range of critical topics that affect equestrian sport’s future. While the organization looks for new concepts for the future to drive growth, Moroney explained, it will take all of the equestrian community stakeholders working together to maximize growth.

“It takes a whole community for all of us to be successful.

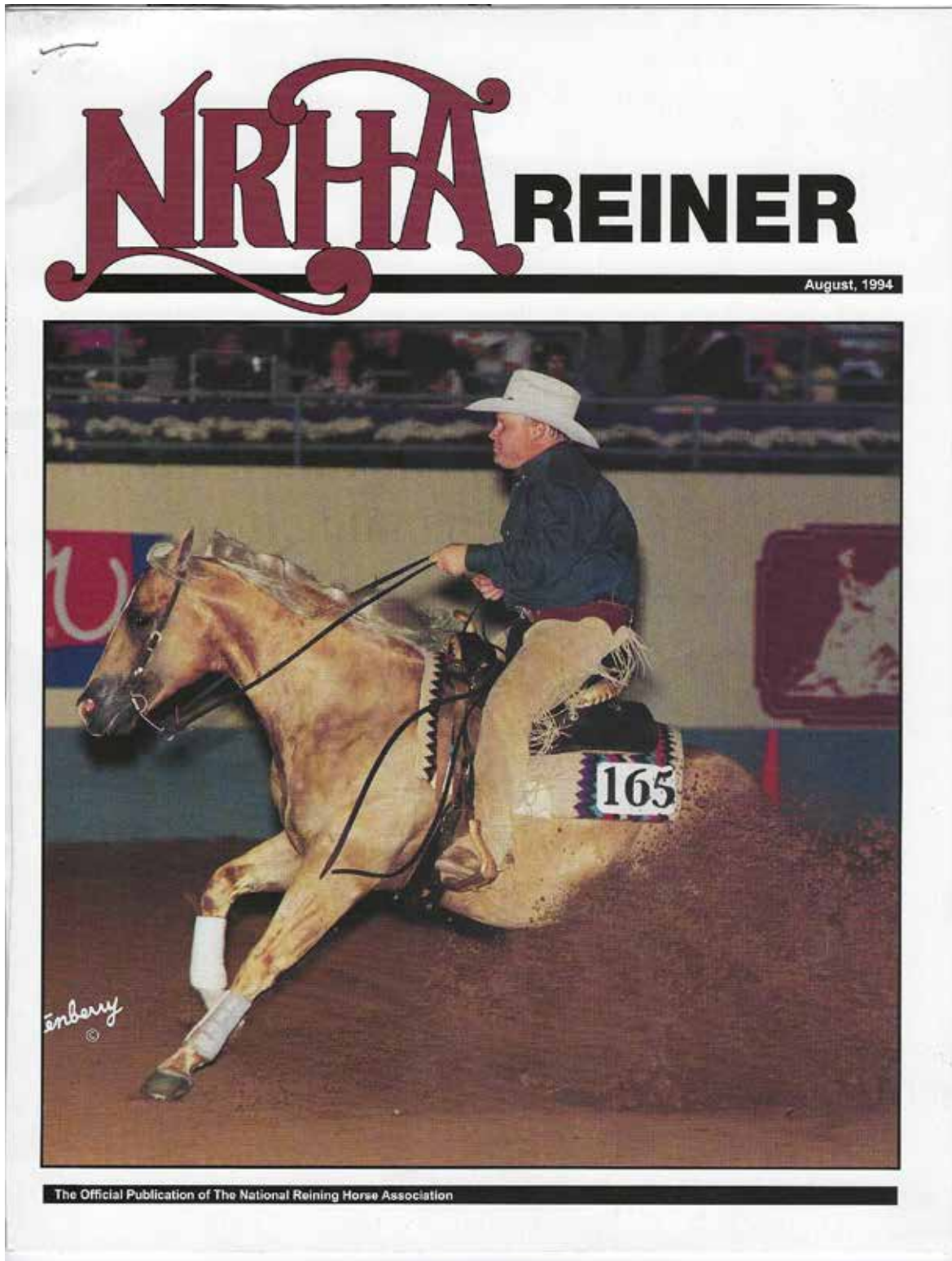

NRHA DERBY OPEN DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP

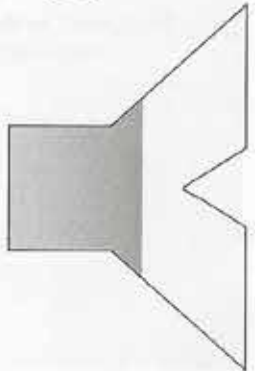
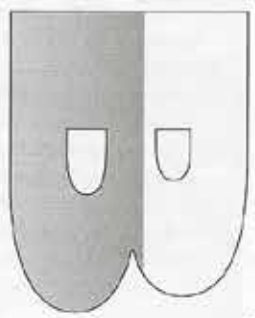
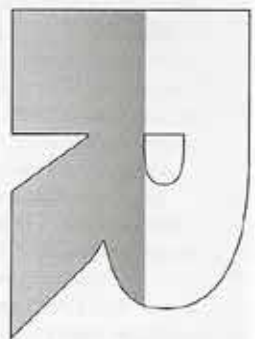
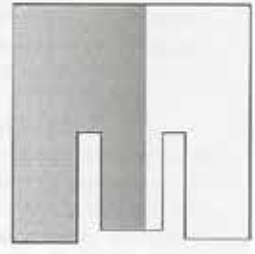
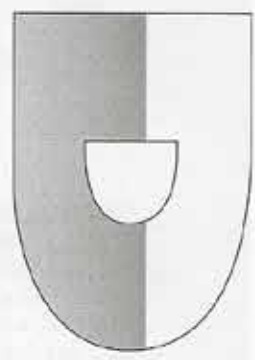
Since its format dictates a clean-slate finals, the championship of the \$45,000 Added NRHA Derby comes down to an "all or nothing" contest. Friday night sees the determination of the Non Pro championship, and the excitement builds for Saturday night's Open and Limited Open round.

1994 finals action was vintage reining excellence. To give an idea of the level of preeminence, eleven of the fifteen open finalists turned in scores of 220 or higher!

High octane reinings are nothing new to Tim McQuay and Shining Spark. They won the AQHA Junior Reining World Championship; then at the Lazy E Classic, their electrifying 230 point finals run was just a point shy of the win.

Although they had settled for the reserve championship in March, this duo would not be denied at the Derby.

The spark had ignited.



NRHA DERBY OPEN DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP

PREMIER EVENTS COMBINE

Formerly two separate shows held in St. Paul, Minnesota and Columbus, Ohio, the NRHA Derby and Superstakes is the National Reining Horse Association's premiere show for aged horses.

NRHA Executive Director Linda Matthews feels that the move to Oklahoma will result in growth in both entries and prize money. "We plan to build this show like we have the NRHA Futurity, and we look for a gradual increase in numbers across the board." Strong sponsor support from Straight Arrow, Saddlesmith, Roper Apparel and Markel Rhulen Insurance, the NRHA and the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce forms the base for future expansion.

The 1994 Derby and Superstakes featured 85 entries - a talented cross-section of the finest four and five year old reining horses in the world. Evaluating their performance as official judges for the event were Gilles Bergeron, Mike Corrington, Dale McDavitt and Pete McAlister. Assisting were scribes, Sonya Meyer, Jan Perkins and Andrea Simons.

Total payoff for the event was \$139,146.43.

The ember had been smoldering since the Lazy E Classic when a pressure cooker finals showcased some of the finest reining runs seen in recent history. At the 1994 NRHA Derby, the scenario played out much like it had at Guthrie.

After the preliminary round, the buzz was, "Just wait for Saturday night. It's going to be exciting."

As one competitor put it, "We all knew it was 'all or nothing'."

Shining Spark drew up twelfth in the finals.

The current class of NRHA elite had already set a blistering pace. Six of those first eleven horses had posted scores over 220 with Bobby Avila and Smartin Off ahead of the pack with a score of 229.

There would be no comfort zone. The pressure was on and Shining Spark was more than equal to the task.

The silvery palomino became a blaze of action, illuminating the arena with a glistening array of maneuvers that never weakened. When the pattern was completed, the crowd waited impatiently.

"The SCORE, for draw number 12, entry number 165, Shining Spark, owned by Carol Rose of Gainesville, Texas and ridden by Tim McQuay, is...."

As the words left announcer Keith Bradley's mouth, the crowd began to cheer. Maybe it was the pause or the inflection on "score", but there was something about his tone that told them that this was the winning run. As Bradley finished "is two thirty and one half", the applauding crowd shouted and whistled their approval.

"I felt really confident going to the show with him," McQuay said. "Then in the finals, it felt like he sure tried to do everything I wanted. If anything, he felt even better than at the Lazy E. I thought he did everything exceptionally well, and his right circles were phenomenal. I don't know if I could get a horse to circle any better. You can push him, then when you quit it's like you turned off a key."

A five year old son of Genuine Doc out of AQHA Superhorse Diamonds Sparkle, Shining Spark is owned by Carol Rose, of Gainesville, Texas. But Carol, his most enthusiastic supporter, was hospitalized early the day of the finals and missed seeing her horse claim the victory.

Even though a detachment of well-wishers delivered a video and the good news right to the hospital within an hour after completion of the finals, it was tough to miss seeing it in person. In Carol's words, "I told the doctor I was going to go see the finals, and he said if I did he would write it up as 'against medical orders', so I stayed in the hospital."

According to Carol, she felt from the very first that "Shiner" would be a great horse. "I've raised some great stallions, and he's one of my favorites. He just keeps getting better. You never know how great a horse is until he gets some age. Then when you call on him as many times as Tim has called on him and he gives it all he's got each time, you see what kind of horse he is. He just gets better under pressure."

McQuay agrees that Shining Spark has a great mind. After the first go Carol asked Tim, "How does he do that every time?"

Tim just pointed to his head. "That's how he does it."

Adds Carol, "He really is consistent. The last three shows, he was 227.5 in the finals of the World Show, then 230 at the Lazy E, then 230.5 at the Derby. He's an outstanding individual, and I also have to credit the job Tim has done with him."

This Derby win was the second for Tim McQuay, who first earned the championship in 1987 on Hollywood Dun It. It was also the second Derby Open Champion out of Rose's phenomenal mare, Diamonds Sparkle.

The Derby Reserve Championship went to Bobby Avila on Smartin Off, owned by Jerry McCann of Kent, Washington. Smartin Off (Smart Little Lena X Miss Cal Sen) was the Open Co-Reserve champion and the Limited Open Reserve champion of the NRHA Futurity in December. "This was a blood and guts show," laughed Avila, referring to the intensity of the finals. "I love that kind of 'no holds barred' reining - the faster the better."

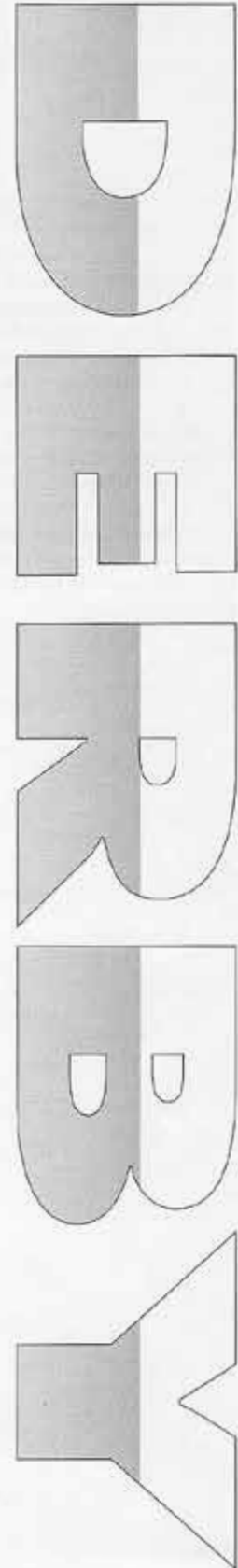
He continued, "We all knew the finals would be wild and high scoring. There were some really great horses in the class that had saved a lot for the finals. I drew up fairly early (9th). I asked my horse for everything he had and he gave it."

Was he disappointed in the finish?

Not really. "If you're going to get beat with a 229, you're just going to get beat," he mused.

For Bobby and associate trainer Todd Bergen, the last two trips to Oklahoma have made the 4400 mile round-trip trek seem short. Their 1993 NRHA Futurity efforts

Todd Bergen had a big grin on his face after the Derby Finals on Saturday night - and with good reason.

He'd just earned his biggest title win to date - the Limited Open Championship of the NRHA Derby - and his 226 score on Tuckerette Command also garnered him fourth place in one of the toughest open finals in recent NRHA history.

Says Todd, "When the fifth horse came out and scored a 226. I thought 'holy cow - I have to really go for it.' It was so exciting. I've never been in the position of having to ask a horse for that much at such a big show."

The Derby was Bergen's first NRHA "major" win, and he gave credit to his partner, Tuckerette Command (Fritz Command X Nite Nite Tucker). The talented mare is owned by Melissa and Rodney Krebs of Poulsbo, Washington. "She is so nice to ride and train. She's been shown since she was three and she just stays so nice and honest. We've qualified her for the World Show in the Senior and Amateur reining, and Melissa will continue to show her in amateur."

"I've wanted to show this mare ever since we've had her," commented Todd, who works with Bobby Avila. "Last year Bobby showed her at the Lazy E and AQHA World Show. At this show, he had two to show so I got to ride her here!"

The big win was timely. "I'm getting married in August and we just bought a house. Maybe we can use some of this for our honeymoon!"

Reserve Limited Open honors went to Rodney Rosenauer on Hollywood Pixie (Poco Squaw Leo X Hollywood Kanda), owned by Geraldine R. Hetz of Fairview, Pennsylvania.

"I guess pattern ten helped," quipped Rosenauer after the Derby finals. He was referring to his celebrated reining demonstration with a broom during the NRHA Town Talk luncheon the day before.

Whatever the cause, Rodney's 224 score elevated him into a player's position in the ultra-tough Derby finals on the "little dun mare with the big heart". "She's the sweetest mare in the world to ride," added Rosenauer.

"I just went to be third," he explained. "I stayed with my consistent program but stepped it up a little bit. I've got a lot of horse and it worked!"

Rosenauer was a finalist at both the NRHA Futurity and the Lazy E Classic on the mare. What's on the agenda next for this duo? "We'll probably go ahead and qualify her, then breed her the first part of next year."

John Slack on Docs Little Calboy (Smart Little Calboy X Dolly Par Doc), owned by Sandra Watrus of Cave Creek, Arizona, and

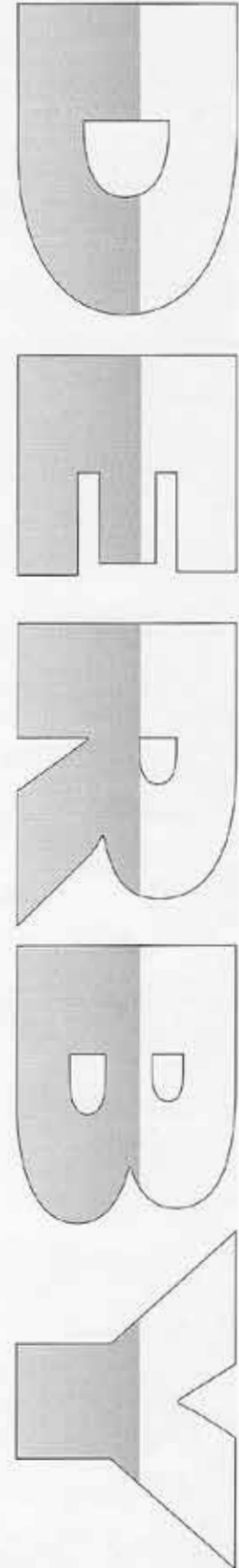
Albert Burton on Sheza Press (Rocky War Glo X Sheza Mardelle Dee), owned by Monte C. Strusiner of Northbrook, Illinois were tie third with 221 scores.

For Slack it was another profitable trip east from Arizona. A leading player in the western influence that is being felt at NRHA Major events, Slack won third on Docs Little Calboy at the 1993 NRHA Futurity, and has figured consistently in both Open and Limited Open competition.

John and Docs Little Calboy's second place finish in the first go boosted their 1994 Derby earnings upward of the three thousand dollar mark.

Burton was happy with his finals performance on Sheza Press. "This mare really likes to work. I think the heat was something she wasn't used to and it took a lot out of her because I prepared her before the Superstakes like I had at other shows and I used her too much. Before the finals I rested her a day and she came back much stronger."

James McCutcheon of River Falls, Wisconsin on his Crystal Doeledoc (VS Tari X Fitz Sugar) was fifth.

Shannon Raymond of Union Bridge, Maryland claimed the Non Pro Championship with a 220.5 finals score on her four year old gelding, Stoppin Strait (Topsail Cody X Fresno Poco Fanny). The 1993 NRHA Non Pro World Champion, Shannon stepped into the futurity limelight when she rode Enterprising Joker to tie third in the Non Pro in the 1993 NRHA Futurity.

She had planned to show that four year old in 1994, but he injured a hock. "We bought Stoppin Strait at the Carolina Classic in April. I hadn't shown at all and I really wanted something to show. This is the first time in eight years that I'm not hauling for a title."

Shannon finished high school the Tuesday before the Derby - "I missed my Senior Trip to the beach to come here!" - so her "pre-Derby" showing schedule had been somewhat limited. "I only got to show him twice before walking into the Derby arena at Oklahoma City. "I was real nervous, but then, usually, the more nervous I am, the better!"

Shannon will attend North Carolina State in the fall, with an eye on a major in communications. "That's going to slow up my showing schedule, some," she admitted. "I do have a horse for the Congress futurity, but school will definitely interfere!"

Stoppin Strait had placed at the Congress Futurity and at the Lazy E classic for former owner, Cindy Smack.

Runner up in the Non Pro Division with a 220 was Christy Morgan of Elbert, Colorado on Zans Diamond Jackie (Zans Diamond Sun X Jacks Miss Scarlet).

Christy, who rides with Steve Swartzenberger, has been showing reiners five years, although this is only her second year to show in NRHA competition. In the AQHA arena, she has been formidable on "Jackie", earning the 1993 AQHA High Point Amateur Reining title, as well as winning her class at the Congress.

Qualified for the World Show again this year, she praises her mare. "She is really easy to show. She has a lot of heart and is so honest." Showing experience is making the process easier, too. "I'm learning how to keep her working a little better, so it makes it more fun!"

Christy is a sophomore at Colorado State University, majoring in Equine Science.

Third went to Carol Rose on Spark O Lena. By Doc O'Lena and out of Carol's phenomenal mare, Diamonds Sparkle, this horse is a half brother to Shining Spark.

"When you have to think about it, it's too late," commented Carol. She was referring to her horse being momentarily distracted in the finals right after his first stop by some movement behind one of the arena gateways into the coliseum. "I didn't know how to get his attention back," she mused. "Tim (McQuay) told me later I should have really pushed him and got his mind back. I'll know next time!"

Next on tap for Spark O Lena is getting qualified for the Junior Reining at the AQHA World Show. "He will also be my Non Pro horse for next year."

Paris Wixon of Hope Hull, Alabama finished fourth on Zans Diamond Skipper (Zans Diamond Sun X Skip's Stardust). Wixon's enthusiasm for showing reiners is contagious. "Can you believe I'm fourth here? I'm so lucky!"



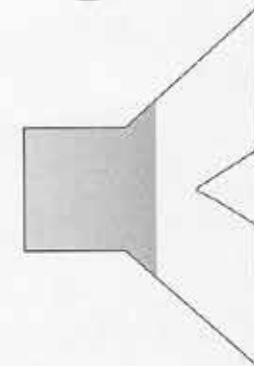
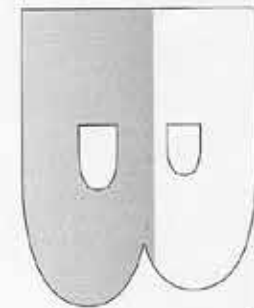
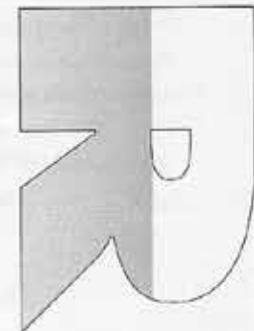
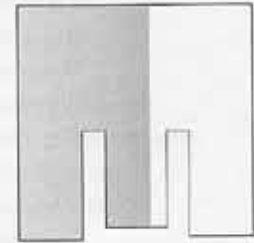
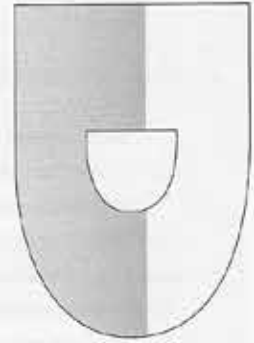
This placing comes right on the heels of a fourth place finish at the Lazy E Classic. "I think the nicest thing for me is that I went much faster here than at the Lazy E and my horse still waited for me."

Paris rides with Scott McCutcheon. "We'll leave him at Scott's until we finish qualifying for the AQHA World Show in Amateur reining, then take him home and rest him until November."

Yvon Mathieu of Descanso, California rode Tuaca Tucker (Doc Tom Tucker X Freckles Fancy Sue) to a tie for first in the first go and fifth place finish in the finals.

Mathieu was the Non Pro Reserve Champion of the 1993 NRHA Futurity on this mare and together they won over \$20,000 in just seven months showing. Their impressive array of wins includes Reno and Tucson, but Tuaca Tucker's showing career is coming to an end. "She's in foal now to my stallion, so this was probably her last show."

THE SUPERSTAKES

This year the Superstakes Championship was determined by the first go of the Derby.

Eligible horses competed in conjunction with their Derby efforts and the Superstakes Awards Presentations followed the first go on Wednesday of Derby Week.

The NRHA Superstakes Open Champion was Dun Buggins 086 (Hollywood Dun It X Devils Gap), ridden by Garth Brown and owned by Robert Heindl of Bend, Oregon.

"He's a special horse," says Garth Brown, when referring to Dun Buggins 86. "He always runs and stops big and he did that up to all expectations. The hot weather seemed to make him a little more temperamental - so he was a little stronger through the circles than usual."

To say this horse stops big is an understatement. In the Superstakes run, his hocks seemed to disappear and he buried himself in Oklahoma dirt up to his stifles. "This horse was really easy to train; he just wants to work."

This was Garth's first time to compete in the Superstakes. "We're 1900 miles away from home, but it was worth it."

For Robert Heindl, reining competition is more than exciting. "This is my first show horse and the Futurity was my first show. I think I lost about ten pounds and some of my life expectancy from the pressure," he jokes.

Heindl, who buys and sells both airplanes and real estate, is originally from Germany, although he has lived in the United States for fifteen years. Now an avid reining aficionado, he will have another futurity horse next year. "This is great!"

The big-stopping Dun Buggins 086 will be shown as a five year old and then will stand at stud in Oregon.

Reserve Superstakes honors went to Scott McCutcheon on Dunit Like A Cowboy for new owner Garry Smith of Springfield, Ohio. Like the famous battery, this horse just keeps going and going. After a co-reserve championship at the Futurity, he won the Lazy E Classic and has emerged as a consistent threat in the class of '94.

"We are really proud of what this horse has done," commented Scott. He continued, "Garry is talented at showing, and he is really looking forward to riding him."

Besides Smith's enthusiasm for his new horse's showing ability, he is also looking at building a breeding program with him according to McCutcheon.

Third place in the Superstakes went to Tim McQuay on Melodys Dun It, a full brother to Dunit Like A Cowboy.

Melodys Dun It is owned by Jennifer Easton. "We'll show him in some open shows," said Tim, when asked about future plans for this horse.

The Limited Open Superstakes title went to Albert Burton on Monte Strusiner's Sheza Press.

Burton won the Superstakes on Great Red Pine in 1992, and on Fast Forward Artie in 1993.

Could he 'three-peat'?

A mare named Sheeza Press had the answer, an emphatic "yes!"

According to Burton, "I bought this horse as a Non Pro prospect, and the idea was that I would show her at these 5 year old events to get her ready for showing Non Pro."

The plan worked well. "I've shown her all year, won five events out of eight, won a little under \$20,000 and five bronzes."

Sheeza Press is bred to be a winner. She's by Press Release, a reserve World Champion Non Pro Horse, and out of a Derby winner, Sheeza Mardelle Dee.

"She's extremely laid back. Monte will show her at the Congress and Oklahoma City. I think her attitude will make her last a long time as a show horse."

Albert continued, "She loves to stop. I don't ride her a lot, and I think I prepared her a little too much before the Superstakes so I gave her a day off before the Derby finals, and she felt a lot stronger."

Darren Stancik earned second on Jac Daniels Neat (Hollywood Jac 86 X Lady Bee Great) for owners Ron Hoppe and Jerry Nye

of Hillsboro, Oregon.

Darren bought the horse as a two year old from Sally Brown for Ron & Jerry.

Bonnie Hippensteel of Westminster, Maryland finished third in the Limited Open and also won the Non Pro Division on Bar Bill BH (Be Aech Enterprise X Ned's Little Star).

Showing Bar Bill BH in the Superstakes was a last minute decision. "Charlie Smith felt this horse would fit me, so I bought him from Frank Constantini at the end of April. He was eligible but not sustained, so I had to pay all the fees and I really hadn't ridden him enough to get used to him or get him ready."

Bonnie continues, "It was real exciting because he's a lot of horse - above my level, really physical and quick. I would have preferred to have had more time to get used to him, but I just put my seat belt on and went for it!"

Bonnie will haul BH along this year but has no plans to show him until next year. "You'll see me in the warm-up pen on him, but I'll wait and show him as a five year old."

Mandy McQuay of Tioga, Texas was reserve Non Pro champion on Hollywoods Striker (Hollywood Dun It X Strike Zone).

Championships are nothing new to this duo. They were Reserve Champion Non Pro at the Congress, then won the Non Pro division of the 1993 NRHA Futurity.

SUPERSTAKES SIRE AWARDS

LORI STANCIK

It was Lori Stancik's first trip to the NRHA Derby and she was the only female rider to earn an invitation to the Saturday night finals.

"It was really exciting," commented Lori. "The guys back there in the warmup area were really supportive. It was great!"

Lori rode Catalyst Lady Di (Taris Catalyst X Docs Manta) to a 218 score and a seventh place finish. The mare is owned by Lori's parents, Ron & Sally Hoppe of Salem, Oregon. "We got her from Jack Brainard as a two year old and (husband) Darren trained her."

Lori also won the \$500 added Ladies Class during Derby week.

The NRHA Superstakes is a showcase for performance - both in the arena and in the sire categories. This year's program featured 24 eligible stallions.

Just shy of \$8,000 was awarded to Superstakes sires of the top three horses in the Open, Limited Open and Non Pro categories, and for the second year in a row, the lion's share of the sire award purse went to Texas.

Hollywood Dun It has arrived! Tim McQuay's former Derby Champion dominated the Superstakes Sire divisions, with his get earning five of the nine sire awards. He collected over \$4400 in sire award dollars.

All three of the top Open winners were by Hollywood Dun It - Dun Buggins 086, Dunit Like A Cowboy, and Melodys Dun It.

In the Non Pro category, second and third went to Hollywoods Striker and Dun It Okie Style, respectively.

A former Superstakes Champion himself, Hollywood Dun It's accomplishments moved him into the Top Five rankings for Superstakes Stallions in only his second year to have get of age!

Tim McQuay is justifiably proud of his stallion. "The last couple of years I think people thought he might be a good horse, but not an open sire. I think the Superstakes cured that! The top three Open Superstakes Horses and third, fifth and six in the Derby were by him."

Be Aech Enterprise, owned by Bill Horn and Rex Hester, earned Superstakes dollars in two categories. He picked up \$872.88 for Bar Bill BH's win in the Non Pro Division, and \$472.31 for his third place finish in the Limited Open category. Be Aech Enterprise is the all-time leading Superstakes sire. At age 19, he has produced get with winnings nearing the million dollar mark in NRHA competition.

Rocky War Glo earned \$1180.78 for owner Ron Higginbotham.

Jac Daniels Neat's second place finish in the Limited Open bracket netted \$708.47 to Hollywood Jac 86's totals. Hollywood Jac 86, although deceased, is still the second leading Superstakes Sire.

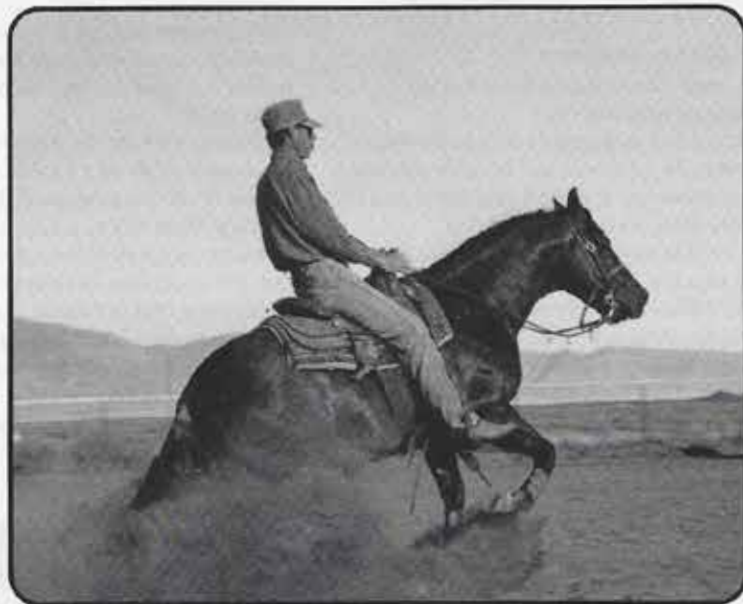

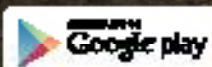
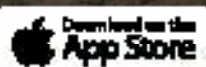

The action began on Thursday morning when Craig Schmersal rode Cee Blair Sailor to a score of 222 and victory in the \$1,000 Added Limited Open. Cee Blair Sailor, currently leading both the NRHA Open and Limited Open standings, is owned by David Connor of Boxford, Massachusetts.

"He was as pure as a young horse - didn't look for trouble anywhere. He waited. You can't expect an experienced horse to show much better than that," Craig said.

He continued, "I've shown him 26 times this year. He's really consistent in getting to the pay window."

Schmersal, who has been training reiners for four years, is a product of AQHA and NRHA Youth competition, and cool under the pressure of high-profile reining.

Second in the Limited Open went to Darren Stancik on Ron and Sally Hoppe's Final Valentine for his 219.5 score.

The Hoppes raised this gelding, and he was Sally's amateur horse until an injury interrupted her showing career. "She'll have back surgery then, hopefully, will be back in the show ring soon."

"Final Valentine is a really good circle horse, but he does well throughout the entire pattern." Darren and his wife, Lori, both show extensively on the AQHA circuit, and have a successful group of youth and amateur riders.

Clem Wold of Maxwell, California came out on top in the Intermediate Non Pro class with Majors Serendipity.

"I love this mare," Clem exclaimed. "She's bred now and I hate to give her up. She's one in a million. She gave me one more great run her, then turns around and packs a ten year old in the youth."

Both Clem and her daughter Colleen posted class wins during Derby week. "I wasn't going to show here here. After all the hard runs she's had, she does have her holes, but then we were here and I thought I'd show her one more time. She's given us so many good times; this last win was just the icing on the cake."

Susan Kraus of San Antonio, Texas was second on Chasin Eighty. "I think I have 'Avis-itis'" she said, referring to her consistent runner-up finishes.

"I'm not complaining, though." She added, "since I've been riding with Ann Salmon, I've consistently marked higher than I ever have with the same horse."

Susan has been showing the eight year old Hollywood Jac 86 gelding for four years, and earned a Silver Certificate in 1993. "He's held up so well. I'm showing more this year, and hope to qualify for the World Show."

In the 31 entry Limited Non Pro class, Purcell, Oklahoma's McKenzie Merrill was the winner aboard Seven S Catulpa by Hollywood Dun It.

The 1990 AQHA Cutting World Champion, McKenzie will be a senior in high

"I got this mare from Craig Johnson in February. Scott McCutcheon found her. We're still getting used to each other."

She has shown the four year old mare in AQHA shows to get her qualified for the World, but this was the first major NRHA event she had entered.

Doe Buyalski of Lakewood, Colorado was second in the Limited Non Pro class in her NRHA Derby debut, aboard her six year old gelding, Three Bars John. Doe, who travels with Derby Non Pro Reserve Champion, Christy Morgan, was happy with her finish.

"I bought this horse at an auction in Shawnee, Oklahoma. He was three, and didn't know anything. I just liked his looks. I had gone to the sale to buy a finished reining mare, saw him and fell in love. I got home and called the AQHA and found his dad had over a hundred reining points."

Doe has shown reiners for four years - but didn't even own a horse before that. In her non-horse time, she is an electrical estimator for building contracting.

Arizona horses dominated the 41 entry Novice Horse classes. Randy Paul won the Novice Horse Open on Wind Her Up Doc,

owned by Shaunda Rai Coakes of Phoenix, Arizona.

Casey Hinton rode Kim Dooley's Major Contribution to second place in the Novice Horse Open. "We got him as a two year old from Bobby Avila," says Kim. "We'll show him to qualify him for the World Show, then maybe show him at the Congress. "Major Contribution is by Major Bonanza, out of Princess Bar King. "He hasn't really been shown that much, yet," she added. Kim, of Scottsdale, Arizona claimed her own win in the Novice Horse Non Pro, when she steered Remedys Magic Potion to victory in that category. She drew up last in the class of 42 and changed the results! This is Kim's second year to show the five year old bay mare. She won the Congress 14-18 reining, and is qualified for the AQHA World Show.

Due to the miracles of modern horse reproduction, Remedys Magic Potion became a mother in May, when her embryo transfer colt by Boomernic was born. Kim is a Junior at Arizona State University and is majoring in Interior Design with a minor in Business. "It's tough to go to school and keep your grades up and to show at a high level at the same time, but it is a challenge," she explains.

Clifford Steif of Woodstock, Illinois was second with Sandman Doc.

Tim McQuay showed his Hollywood Dun It 'look-alike', Faithfully Dun, to a 216.5 score for the win in the Snaffle Bit Open class. This young horse's uncanny resemblance to his sire is deceiving and prompted several Derbygoers to comment. "What's Tim doing with Hollywood Dun It here?"

"He's a nice horse," commented Tim. "I don't know which one of us will show him in the big futurity - me or Mandy - but right now he's on my top three list!"

Second in the Snaffle Bit Open went to Randy Paul on Ima Stoppin Jose, owned by Dave Belson of Cave Creek, Arizona.

Penguin Jessie Jack, owned and ridden by Yvon Mathieu of Descanso, California, won the Snaffle Bit Non Pro category, and Yvon was second on his other mount, Plain Sallinic.

What kind of name is Penguin Jessie Jack? Mathieu, formerly of the cold-weather country up in Canada, met his wife in Acapulco, and she nicknamed him Penguin, or Penguin, in reference to the cold northern climate he was accustomed to.

When it came time to name this colt, that's the name she chose, according to Mathieu.

The yellow colt, by Hollywood Jac 86, looked confident his first time out. "He's naturally a great stopper - real smooth." Yvon will show him at Reno, then the NRHA Futurity.

Plain Sallinic was second in the Snaffle Bit Non Pro. "This was her second show. I took her to one schooling show." By Just Plain Colonel, out of a Reminic mare, Plain Sallinic is also NRHA Futurity bound.

Riding and reining got easier for Yvon a few months ago when he moved into his new home and horse facility. "It's great," he said. "We've got fifteen acres, and our own track, lots of trees, and space for our broodmares."

Lori Stancik piloted Ron and Sally Hoppe's Final Valentine to victory in the \$500 Added Ladies class. "This is actually my mom's (Sally's) amateur horse, but she had a back injury and is unable to show right now."

Darren Stancik, Lori's husband, trained Final Valentine and the seven year old has been shown extensively although he was not shown in futurities. "He's a really easy horse to show. We call him the 'Timex horse' because you can just always count on him."

The Stanciks will show Final Valentine at the AQHA World Show, then he will be leased to a youth, Jamie Parker, to ride until Sally is able to compete again.

Flis Sassella of Marietta, Oklahoma rode her Watch Cody Smoke to second in the Ladies Class. A four year old, the flashy stocking-legged, bald-faced gelding is by Topsail Cody and was trained by Flis and her husband Rich.

How does a Hawaiian become a reiner. "My school had hunters and jumpers as part of its program, so I rode them for five years, then gradually progressed to the reining. Nowadays she rides with Randy Pau so she keeps Mr Bay Bear in Arizona and spends much of the summer on the "mainland".

Lexie specializes in showing reining and working cow horses. She finished fourth at the AJQHA World Show in Working Cow Horse. She has been showing in the AQHA for over two years, but this was her first major NRHA event.

Charles Moeller and Docs Turn An Burn were second.

The youth classes roster of last names read just like a normal list of Open and Non Pro competitors at a major reining - with familiar names like Weiderholt, Wold, Milholland, McCutcheon. Only, this was a fresher crew - unwrinkled, enthusiastic - a little excited - and very talented.

Josh Hattig of Berthoud, Colorado, rode Remic Chex to win the Youth 14-18 class after a tie-breaking finish with Tim Wenger of Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania on Dry Doc Clymer. They both scored 214.5 to tie, then

Evidently, the opportunity to assess the pen helped. After the victory, Colleen was ready to discuss her win - with her own personal entourage ("our team") in attendance. "This is Lindsay Paul (8), Cristen (7) and Caitlyn Klipfel (2), and Cecilia (name and age unknown - due to a language barrier)."

What do they do?

"They help me."

How?

"Well, we play."

The formula seems to work. Colleen and her mom each won a class on Majors Serendipity.

Jenny Wiederholt of Hastings, Minnesota was second on Jessies Legacy. Perennial Non Pro contender, Charlie

Wiederholt commented, "She was ready, but not nearly as nervous as her Dad!"

Charlie, who has had a successful tenure as Jessies Legacy's rider, is turning over the reins to his daughter. "Jennie will ride her until we breed her."

When Jenny is not reining, she enjoys soccer and skiing.

SADDLESMITH COMPETITION AT THE DERBY OPEN DIVISION

The reining action was intense on Friday night of Derby week when the \$3,000 Added Saddlesmith Open ended in an exciting tie-breaking work-off.

It was a case of the new wave challenging the old guard - with a few twists.

Tim McQuay was riding Oliviero Toscani's distinctive Tavis Valentine and the eye-catching four year old was 'on'. He delivered a beautiful run with spins that were fast, low and right on the mark.

Craig Schmersal was aboard David Connor's veteran World Champion Cee Blair Sailor. His trademark big, big stops were picture perfect.

Each horse scored 223.5.

Time for a tie-breaker.

Both stallions are exceptional individuals. Both have the distinctive Pieper Ranch brand on their hip. But the night belonged to Cee Blair Sailor. Craig Schmersal piloted him to a 223 score to meet the challenge and win the event.

"Since February, we haven't been home three weekends," said Craig. He goes to every reining; he just stays fresh and he really loves the ground here."

According to Craig, Cee Blair Sailor is "like Dennis the Menace. He can take his halter off. He's almost human - always curious."

Tim McQuay made the decision to show Tavis Valentine in the Open after not making the Derby finals. "I should have shown him harder in the preliminaries. I overspun and underspun and that kept me out of the finals. After the Lazy E, I expected him to be more 'up' but he's really a quiet kind of horse. When I asked him for the run in the Open, he sure worked."

Right behind the leaders was Arizonan John Slack on Prime Time, owned by the Olde Stone Ranch Co. of Cave Creek, Arizona. His 223 score was good for third place in the Saddlesmith Open.

NON PRO DIVISION

Michael Hancock of Rocky Mount, North Carolina, dominated the \$3,000 Added Saddlesmith Non Pro class on Ms Majestic Jac with a shiny 222.5 score.

It's become a habit. Hancock and Ms Majestic Jac won the Saddlesmith Non Pro event at the NRHA Futurity, the Carolina Classic, and the Derby.

Not surprisingly, Hancock is appreciative of the Saddlesmith program. "This program gives the person who can't or prefers not to travel an opportunity to be recognized for doing well at the major shows."

Hancock does well at majors and his mare has earned a total of 18 bronzes as well as somewhere around the \$35,000 mark in lifetime earnings.

What's next for Michael? "I will be hauling my daughter Catherine to the AQHA World Show."

And for Ms Majestic Jac? "I promised this mare that if she did well at the Carolina Classic and at the Derby that I would breed her with an embryo transfer and she wouldn't have to carry the baby."

Does Hancock keep his promises?

"Sure, she's at Babcock's now, being bred to Smart Chic Olena!"

Wakopa Reys King, ridden by Amanda Connor for her dad, David Connor, was second in the Saddlesmith Non Pro class.

FREESTYLE DEMONSTRATION

A highlight of Derby week came Saturday afternoon when Rocky and Delise Dare teamed up with Doug and Valerie Milholland to present a Freestyle Reining Clinic.

Attendees were treated to two very diverse but equally successful approaches to this event that is such a great promotional tool for reining.

Music selection is a big factor in putting together a successful freestyle presentation. "Strong music that speaks to me is a must," said Valerie, who, for the most part, uses pre-recorded music.

Delise agreed, and added, "We like music with words to help Rocky recognize where he needs to be at each point." The Dares generally have their music professionally prepared.

"We prepare by practicing segments of the routine in an arena that is the size of the arena we'll be in. This lets me know how fast to go and still stay in time with the music," said Doug.

Rocky prepares by working the pattern to music on another horse.

"Remember," they both cautioned, "a

horse learns the music and will anticipate. You usually only get one or two great runs to a particular piece of music before the horse starts to listen to it."

Both agreed that it's hard to show a freestyle horse to a big crowd with loud music because it's hard for the horse to hear verbal cues. "They have to really be tuned in," said Rocky, "so I like to get into the warm up area as close to the noise as possible and get them used to listening for me."

Rocky and Doug stressed the importance of maintaining a high level of skill in executing the reining maneuvers. "The main thing is: it's still a reining class," commented Rocky. "No matter how much time and effort you have put into the routine, music and costuming, you have to make sure that the horse can handle the maneuvers."

"Remember that," added Doug, "the more you can do maneuvers that judges know how to mark - ones they're familiar with - the better. Of course, they always bonus things like stopping or spinning with no hands - but those are familiar maneuvers - just done differently."

netted them over \$70,000, and their share of the Derby take was over \$15,000.

"It sure makes the trip worthwhile."

According to Bobby, Smartin Off is working better than ever. "Since the Futurity, I know him better — he's stronger and more broke."

A shoeing adjustment also made a difference. "He was having a little trouble getting used to the ground in Oklahoma City. He'd jerk a leg out of the ground in the stop. I think that the change helped him handle the ground better at the Derby."

Finishing third with a 227.5 marking was Scott McCutcheon on Dunit Like A Cowboy (Hollywood Dun It X Stages Melody).

'Cowboy', who was Open Co-Reserve Champion of the 1993 NRHA Futurity, was also the Lazy E Classic Champion. Formerly owned by Sally Broten, the horse was purchased by Garry Ray Smith of Springfield, Ohio, prior to the Derby.

"The harder I ask him, the more he tries," commented McCutcheon. "He was really good through the circles and never looked at the center."

McCutcheon was complimentary on the depth of talent at the Derby. "The horses that placed ahead of us were great, and there were some behind us that were great, too."

Dunit Like A Cowboy will be hauled to qualify for the World Show, then shown there. After that the future is open. "Garry might show him Non Pro next year, or we might decide to haul him for an open title. I think he'll be a great open horse."

Todd Bergen rode Tuckerette Command (Fritz Command X Nite Nite Tucker), owned by Melissa and Rodney Krebs of Poulosbo, Washington, to a 226.5 finals score — good for fourth place in the Open. "What a thrill — I'm just really excited to finish in the top five in the Open," commented Bergen. His Open rankings added another \$3525 to his Derby week earnings.

"I knew I had a couple of mistakes in my first run that I could improve upon. With the scores so high, I had no choice but to let it all hang out. It was great."

Fifth place went to Tim McQuay on Jennifer Easton's Melodys Dun It (Hollywood Dun It X Stages Melody) with a 226 score, giving Tim the distinction of riding two horses to top five finishes, and this one's spins might be the most memorable of the finals. "He felt really good all the way through," said Tim.

Melodys Dun It is a full brother to Dunit Like A Cowboy, and McQuay will be showing a full sister to these two horses at the NRHA Futurity. □
